We continue to live into the Pentecost Season or what also is known as Ordinary Time, the longest liturgical season of the year. As we live into this mystery, and allow ourselves to experience this from one small place to the next, we realize the Spirit is contagious, shareable and reshapes the world. That's what we're on about, changing the moment from one to another in God's love.

# Meet Amy Brown

Amy Brown calls herself a "cradle Episcopalian". She is the daughter of Prince of Peace Episcopal Church founders in Woodland Hills where she and her brother and sister were born and raised. When she moved to Simi Valley in 1989, she knew she

had found her Simi Valley "spiritual home and community" at St. Francis. Led by Rev. Barbara Mudge, the congregation was so small it fit in the main building of what is now the Samaritan Center.

Amy has been very busy over the years. She attended UCLA and later received her Master of Arts in Education. She married her husband Fred with whom she raised two daughters. Fred supported her and the family when Amy and her best friend Fran began a Chatsworth summer camp in 1982, each contributing \$1,000. The camp became such an overwhelming success that they



were able to lease a

16-acre camp site with a small school and swimming pool on it. Over seven years they created a beautiful facility with an archery range, 15 horses, a fish pond and a huge clientele. Knowing that the grounds and school were about to be sold in 1987, Amy and her friend bought a small school in Simi Valley, which they grew in 27 years to 300 students at a five-acre facility. When her friend was ready to retire, they sold the school in 2014 but she remained with the new owners to assist with the transition until 2019.

Amy and Fred lost their older daughter Megan in

1997 to a sudden heart ailment. She was a senior at La Reina High School. The church community led by Rev. Julie Christian was there for her family with



tremendous support. "God was with us and we were able to survive and, in many



ways, prosper as the years went by." Their daughter Kaitlin attended UC San Diego and received her PHd in anthropology/archeology from UC Santa Barbara and now teaches at CSUN. Rev. Sarah presided over Kaitlin and her husband Wren's wedding ceremony

in December of 2020. They are parents of a beautiful grandson and live in Moorpark. \*A granddaughter is about to be born

very soon. Fred has some health issues and will have surgery next month to help him walk.

Retirement hasn't slowed down Amy. She has traveled to more than 22 countries. Amy has



spent many years serving St. Francis.

She became Bishop's Warden during the previous vicar's ministry. Having rotated the position every three

years, she currently serves today on the Bishop's Committee.

"I am so profoundly grateful for Christ in my life and for church as well as the St. Francis community. I have so

many friends here who share in my faith, and our wonderful Sarah who has helped me in innumerable ways, most especially with her positive and contagious faith and outlook."

#### Meet Our New Music Ministers/Directors

#### **Stephen LeBlanc**



Music has been the center of Stephen LeBlanc's life since he was 6 years old. That's when our new music director began studying piano with a private teacher. The child of musicians in his hometown of Memphis, Tenn., Stephen was destined to devote his life to music. He studied at Vanderbilt University's Blair School of Music in Nashville, Tenn., and also studied jazz piano at the New England Conservatory of Music later joining the L.A. Jazz Workshop Big Band earning a jazz keyboard performance certificate from the Dick Grove School of Music.

Stephen graduated with a Bachelor of Music from California Lutheran University in Thousand Oaks. Over the past 30 years, Stephen has worked as a professional touring and recording musician for successful artists including Jason Bonham, and A Fine Frenzy. He has recording

credits on three major label albums, several television appearances, and has performed in 48 states. Stephen has also performed live, and on television, in England, Germany, France, Austria, Portugal and The Netherlands.

Raised a Catholic, Stephen was the organist and piano player at three masses a week as a teenager and has been playing music for Episcopalian and Lutheran services.

#### Michael J Mani



Joining us at St. Francis is music minister Michael J. Mani, a Grammywinning composer

and record producer. Classically trained as a pianist, Michael's career began in San Francisco

working with multi-platinum music producers Walter Afanasief and Narada Michael Walden. He also excelled at song production and composition and was soon working with top artists including Mariah Carey and Whitney Houston.

Michael continued to climb the ladder of the Bay Area music scene and rose to the top of the commercial composition scoring market, working with top advertising agencies and video game developers such as Foote, Cone and Belding, Sega and EA Sports. In 2000 he collaborated with Santana and won a Grammy award for his work on the

"Supernatural" album featuring Eric Clapton. Michael then discovered young singing sensation Tori Kelly and signed her to a record deal with Geffen Records. This led him to Los Angeles and a publishing deal with EMI Music. He quickly excelled as an in house writer/producer, which led to collaborations with other top artists including J-Lo, Kesha, Tech N9NE, Lady Gaga, and the Backstreet Boys.

He started The JAM Studios in North Hollywood. It was here he discovered and started developing Latin singing/rapping sensation Becky G. He was able to secure a record and production deal for her and with RCA Records and producer Dr. Luke.

Michael lives in Los Angeles and continues to be in high demand for his album production mastery, and expertise penning compositions and scores for TV and film.
